

An opaque observation panel ensures patient privacy but, at the swipe of a card or fob, can be rendered instantly clear. The time and the name of the staff member are instantly logged to create an auditable record.

To prevent barricading, the door features an instant release anti-barricade jamb operated by the same card or fob; no keys or tools are needed.

The door recently won the Product Design for Healthcare Application Award at the Design & Health World Congress & Exhibition in Australia.
