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IHEEM's newly appointed CEO, Julian Amey, says his priorities include broadening the Institute's membership, further raising its profile and influence, building on its sound relationships with other engineering institutions and trade bodies, and developing its role as a high quality education and information provider to healthcare estates management and engineering professionals. *HEJ* editor, Jonathan Baillie, reports.

New IHEEM CEO takes over the helm

Julian Amey – who became IHEEM's new CEO on 30 April – is a former Chief Executive of the Chartered Institution of Building Services Engineers, who previously served as executive director of BBC English at the BBC World Service. He has a particular interest in education and training, how membership organisations can raise membership numbers and identify new income streams, and in international business, educational, and cultural affairs.

As CIBSE Chief Executive from 2001 to 2006, he led efforts to grow and develop the Institution's UK and international membership and its events and publications programme, organised events such as the CIBSE Annual Dinner and President's Dinner, and, via a 'five-year plan' that focused on areas including growing membership and subscriptions, CPD programmes, fund-raising, and increasing volunteer involvement, increased income from £8 million to £11 million during his time in office. He also led the Institution's UK and international development, and formed alliances with engineering and other professional bodies to improve influence on Government and policy formation, especially in the areas of climate change, energy efficiency, and environmental

#### Need for a strong voice

He says: "I am delighted to be joining IHEEM at a very interesting time for the UK healthcare sector. With significant uncertainty about how the NHS reforms will impact on the estate, there has never been a more important time for IHEEM to continue forging strong relationships with other professional engineering institutes and trade associations so that, wherever possible, such bodies can speak with one voice and effectively represent their members' interests.

"I very much hope that my previous 'not-



for-profit' and educational publishing and broadcasting experience will enable me to drive forward the next stage of IHEEM's development, and to widen public recognition of the Institute's work, and the status of its members. I am particularly keen to broaden the Institute's membership and appeal, and to attract younger members – a goal that I am convinced we can achieve by harnessing the broad spectrum of different channels, including the Internet and social media, now available."

Having set up a regionally-organised subscription-based 'Patrons' group scheme at CIBSE that raised funds for capital projects and bursaries for those unable to afford 'the rising costs' of further or higher education, Julian Amey says he is also keen to work with IHEEM's Company Affiliates 'to better serve industry and IHEEM members'.

#### Developing qualifications

Since June 2011, he has run his own, London-based education and media consultancy. In his two immediately preceding roles, as Chief Executive at both Trinity College London, an international arts examination awarding body, and the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing, he developed new qualifications and websites, and extended the two organisations' UK, regional, and overseas activities, with the help of volunteer support.

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The holder of a BA (Hons) degree in Economics and Politics from Magdalene College, Cambridge, he began his career as an executive trainee with educational publisher, Pearson Longman, where he successfully built up the company's business in both Latin America and the Asia Pacific region, subsequently becoming international sales and marketing director responsible for Europe, India, South East Asia, Japan, and China.

#### World Service role

He adds: "Between 1989 and 1994 I was executive director for BBC English at the BBC World Service, responsible for the financial performance and production of all radio and television programmes and publications. There I brought together a £3 million consortium to fund a 60-programme English language learning series which reached a 100 million audience, and 60 million people in China alone. I subsequently had spells with the DTI, developing business and educational partnerships between UK companies and universities and their counterparts in Europe, Asia, and Latin America, and as director-general of Canning Town a business and cultural institute with interests in Spain, Portugal, and Latin America, which provides information services to governments, companies, and individuals. My remit included negotiating grants from the EU, FCO, and DTI, establishing a scholarship programme in support of partner universities in the UK to promote student and business exchanges with universities and companies in Spain, Portugal, and Latin America. and growing individual membership."

#### A passion for communications

A Governor of Bath Spa University, and a BBC-nominated Trustee for the educational Trust, 'International House', which promotes the use of English worldwide, Julian Amey is a fluent Spanish and Portuguese speaker, and a member of CIBSE and the English Speaking Union, and a Fellow of the RSA.

He adds: "I have a particular passion for good communications, both via 'traditional' media, and through the new 'social media', and see *Health Estate Journal* as an excellent forum for sharing knowledge with members.

"I view the IHEEM CEO role as an exciting opportunity to work closely with the Board of Trustees to embed the Institute's core values, and to build on the organisation's achievements to substantially increase its membership, income, effectiveness, and reputation, as well as its UK and international influence, over the next 10 years."

# Looking at the future health landscape

A combination of seven plenary sessions and 24 stream sessions will offer attendees at this year's Healthcare Estates annual conference in Manchester with 'an unrivalled range and depth of content', according to the conference's organisers, i2i Events Group.

"With the recent enactment of the Health and Social Care Bill, it is a major priority for the estates community to understand how the new Act will impact and shape the development and provision of healthcare services. How and where care is delivered wil change; it is essential that estates professionals have a voice in ensuring the the delivery of quality patient care in the future," said the conference organisers.

#### Government speaker

The opening plenary sessions at Healthcare Estates 2012, which will take place at Manchester Central from 9-10 October, will feature a Government speaker outlining what the Act means for the healthcare estates community. A panel of NHS representatives, including a chief executive, a finance director, estates directors, and a clinical commissioning group executive, as well as private sector representatives, will also discuss 'the practicalities of changing estates

needs as part of healthcare reform'.

The day one conference programme will conclude with an interview with a private sector healthcare provider, followed by a session focused on how engineers, architects, and clinicians, can work together to create the most safe and efficient patient care environment. In between there will be four stream

sessions 'packed with practical and best practice examples', covering:

- Architecture and design.
- Waste management and decontamination.
- Governance and culture.
- Finance and PFI.

Day two will start with plenary sessions exploring the role of NHS Property Services, and the changes for primary and community estates, followed by a focus on 'translating sustainability guidance into practice', with

sustainability best practice case study presentations. After lunch four further stream sessions will cover:

- Energy and sustainability.
- Infection control and water systems.
- Design and architecture.
- Technical updates.

## IHEEM awards 're-launched'


IHEEM has taken the strategic decision to 'review and revitalise' its annual awards scheme to give the whole of the healthcare supply chain – rather than just the Institute's members – the opportunity to participate.

As well as making most of the existing awards open to all, IHEEM is also looking to introduce some new and exciting categories (these will be announced in June's *HEJ*).

## Exhibition already 'over 60% sold'

This year's Healthcare Estates exhibition, meanwhile, is already 'over 60 % sold'.

#### Focus on mental health

Steve Webb said: "One of our initiatives in 2012 is our involvement with, and support of, the Design in Mental Health Network (DIMHN). The organisation's aims include seeking funding for research, and developing links with other organisations to help improve the standard of accommodation and facilities for mentally unwell people across the UK. DIMHN said:

"The Network has agreed a significant presence at the IHEEM exhibition. We will start with a study tour and site visits on the day before the event opens, and, at the exhibition itself, will hold a meeting, with presentations and advice clinics, and have a stand. DIMHN members who attend will have 'VIP status' (see *HEJ* – March 2012) at the exhibition. This takes us to a new level in our involvement with IHEEM, and heralds a working partnership which we hope will live up to both organisations' ideals." Details of the presentations and advice clinics will be announced shortly.

## Seminars to feature BRE and HSE experts

Entitled 'Plan Today for a Sustainable Tomorrow', the Sustainability seminar will be held on 16 May at a London venue to be confirmed, and is the second to cover this important topic to be staged by IHEEM in recent weeks, the first having been held in Birmingham on 19 April.

London-Loughborough Centre for Doctoral Research in Energy Demand – representing the Design & Delivery of Robust Hospital Environments in a Changing Climate (HEJ - June 2010) project team, and Katy Bryan, sustainability manager, and Richard Tandy, national sales manager, Healthcare Lighting, both of Philips Lighting.

### Water seminars to tackle 'invisible threats'

"Nothing new ever happens in the water field. I've heard it all before". "Although we sometimes hear this phrase, in fact the very opposite is true," says Siân Barker, who is keen that potential delegates are also aware of two upcoming IHEEM seminars taking place in July (in Leeds on the 17th of the month, and in London on the 19th) focusing on the 'Invisible Threats' to estates and facilities personnel responsible for the safety of hospital water systems that come in engineering, microbiological, and regulatory form (HEJ – March 2012).

Siân Barker said: "In the past two years we've had a new British Standard on Legionellosis risk assessment, new guidance document on *Pseudomonas* following the death of neonates in Belfast (see also pages 29-34 of this issue), new SHTM04 guidance on water, new BS8558:2011 guidance which replaces BS.6700, continuing discussion about the risks from flexible hoses, and debate on using fewer thermostatic mixing valves – all against a backdrop of significant pressure to reduce costs. Water hygiene is one of many risks that need to be resourced and managed."

Topics covered will include how to minimise the risk of waterborne infection, water hygiene issues generally, competing and antagonistic risks such as scalding and environmental impact, and other key water management and impact reduction measures.

#### **HSE** expertise

John Newbold - HM Specialist Inspector for the HSE - has confirmed his participation in these two 'The Invisible Threat' seminars, which will be chaired by David Harper – a well-known ex-hospital engineer and expert in waterborne contamination prevention and emergency response who runs his own consultancy. Other speakers will include Dr Nick Hill, technical director, the Water Hygiene Centre; Clare Reynolds, laboratory manager (Water Testing), Brighton & Sussex University Hospitals NHS Trust; Steve Mount - Legionella consultant, Steve Mount Associates; Alan Hambidge - director, Empathy Environmental Consultants, and Rob Griffiths, Legionella consultant (Water Regulations), at Griffiths Associates.

The water seminars are being supported by an education grant provided by Pall Medical.
